Managing Fleet Safety Program	1 hour
Fundamentals of creating and managing a small fleet safety program.	
My Conduct at a Traffic Accident Scene	1 hour
What to do and what not to do if you are involved in a traffic accident scene , employee rights and responsibilities.	
Winter Driving & Survival	1 hour
Safe and prudent driving practices and safety equipment to carry when driving in snow, low visibility, icy conditions and other winter conditions. Also covered in Coaching the Experienced Driver.	

Drug & Alcohol

CDL Drug and Alcohol Awareness	1 hour
This is the required drug and alcohol knowledge class required for CDL holders, covers health consequences of chronic use of drugs/alcohol and overview of CDL testing program.	
CDL Supervisor Drug and Alcohol Recognition	2 hours
This is the required drug and alcohol knowledge class required for all supervisors of county employees. Discusses the recognition principles and practices for supervisors to observe and document. Also satisfies the Federal DOT requirements of 1 hour of drug and 1 hour of alcohol training requirements on the symptoms of abuse. Procedures and standards covered qualify supervisors to determine when the "reasonable suspicion" test should be required.

Drug and Alcohol Recognition for Supervisors

3 hours

This is the required drug and alcohol knowledge class required for non CDL employees, plus drug or alcohol recognition principles and practices for public agency supervisors of non-CDL holders. Procedure and standards covered qualifying supervisors to determine reasonable suspicion.

General Safety

Accident & Incident Investigations for Supervisors

1 hour

Designed to provide info to Supervisors who conduct accident/incident investigations and provide assistance in determining the general causes of employee accidents and county property damage.

Active Threat Response (Active Shooter)

1 hour

Designed to provide a discussion of where threats may come from in the workplace, a history of active threat incidents and steps to take to prevent potential problems.

Airborne Pathogens

2 hours

Basic personal safety and personal health management class on required methods used to prevent, control, and minimize risks from contamination by airborne illnesses in various workplaces. Distinguishes between airborne causes of infection and those that are transmitted by other means. Does not meet requirements for health care providers as professional.

Basic First Aid with Health Emergencies

1 hour

Covers the ABC's (Airway, Breathing and Circulation) of 1st Aid and recognizing stroke symptoms and responses. Awareness class only.

Bloodborne Pathogens

2 hours

The special methods used to prevent control and minimize risks from contamination by bloodborne pathogens in various workplaces. Covers universal precaution methods.

Chain Saw Safety Awareness

1 hour

This class discusses proper use and common hazards of working with chain saws, including selection, starting and operating, maintenance, transportation, and personal protection. Also reviews kickback hazards and cutting techniques to relieve tension while bucking and limbing.

Cold Weather Safety

1 hour

Basic personal safety class on how to work, dress and keep yourself and your coworkers healthy and free from workplace illness or injury when working outside in cold or cold and wet weather conditions.

Confined Space Awareness

2 hours

What confined space is and its potential hazards and process required to safely enter and survive.

Construction Site Safety

1 hour

Basic safe working principles as applied to conditions commonly found on construction site with particular emphasis on inspecting for safety violations, remediating them and responding to safety incidents/accidents while on a construction site. Designed for Building Inspectors.

Basic personal safety class on understanding, evaluating, identifying and avoiding personal and workplace risks due to fire and flammable conditions in the home, and childproofing a home or building from common fire hazards.	
First Aid and Stroke Briefing	1 hour
Covers the ABC's (Airway, Breathing and Circulation) of 1st Aid and recognizing stroke symptoms and responses. Awareness class only, no certification.	
Foodborne Illnesses	1 hour
Covers steps to prevent the spread of foodborne illnesses while preparing, serving and storing food items.	
Hand and Power Tool Safety	1 hour
Basic safety course for all new employees and refresher course for all employees on the steps every worker should always follow to avoid personal injury or workplace accidents due to careless use or misuse of hand and power tools. Safe Chemical Handling for PCP's

2 hours

This is a "Right to Know" class on chemical substances directed toward janitorial and home health care. What everyone needs to know about handling, using, storing and transporting common cleaning chemicals.

Safe Chemical Handling/Chemical Safety in Workplace

2 hours

This is a "Right to Know" class on chemical substances in the workplace, what an employee and a supervisor need to know about general duty safety rules on recognizing, handling, using, storing, and transporting common chemical hazardous substances and when and where to get more information.

Safety in the Home

2 hours

Basic personal safety class on understanding, evaluating, identifying and avoiding personal and workplace risks due to common causes of accidents and injuries in the home and childproofing a home or building from these common hazards. For home visits by DHSS & PCP's.

Trail Building Tool Safety

2 Hour

This class is for county employees conducting trail building operations including use of chainsaws. This class will cover the typical hand tools used in trail building as well as the safe use of and operation of chainsaws

Workers' Compensation and Accident Investigation Briefing

1 hour

Determine root cause and contributing factors, tracking and completion of corrective measures and actions.

Human Resources

ADA Awareness

2 hours

A basic course for all public entity staff, employees and volunteers on the Americans with Disabilities Act and federal and state rules on responding to persons with disabilities. Basic disability etiquette toward persons with disabilities is discussed. Duties to the public including customers, service applicants, service clients, job applicants and employees under the ADA are explained in a variety of contexts. The reasonable accommodation process is briefly explained. A variety of physical, mental, speech, hearing and other types of disabilities are used as examples.

ADA Basics for Supervisors and Managers

2 hours

This explains the ADA and related laws and how they affect your actions as a supervisor or manager of public services and employees. It reviews basic information from the ADA Awareness and Public Entity Duties class. The duties of any Supervisor or Manager under the ADA and the limits that privacy rules impose are explained. Common workplace situations with clients or employees that should alert the Supervisor or Manager to recognize potential disability requests are discussed. Participants are taught how, when and why to document such situations and ask for further human resource, ADA or disability expert assistance. Sample forms and reference lists are provided.

Avoiding Termination Claims in Colorado

1 hour

Presentation on the red flags of termination, the at-will doctrine, the ADA, COBRA and FMLA.

<i>Avoiding Wrongful Termination (Hiring and Firing for Colorado County Supervisors)</i>	1-2 hours
Short seminar designed to acquaint elected officials and/or supervisors with the laws in Colorado governing "at-will" principles. Know the limits of an employer's rights before you cost the county an employment claim.	
<i>Civil Rights, Discrimination and Harassment Prevention</i>	2 hours
Provides public sector employees and supervisors a basic understanding of the laws against discrimination, retaliation and harassment based on race, color, national origin, religion, sex and sexual orientation, gender and marital status. Explains the process and duty of identifying, reporting, investigating and preventing conduct that can lead to hostile work environments and/or retaliation and discrimination claims by the public or employees.	
<i>Civility and the Importance of Civil Discard in County Government</i>	1 hour
This class explores the significance of civil dialogue among government leaders. It emphasizes building a culture of respect, integrity, trust, and accountability, while honoring diverse perspectives. Participants will learn how to engage in constructive disagreement, even in high-tension situations, fostering a respectful environment for discussions.	
<i>Confidentiality and Privacy Rules for Employees</i>	2 hour
Discusses the various legal sources of the many types of privacy rules. Covers the how, when and where that counties can use to limit an employee's expectation of privacy regarding county equipment, systems, work and communications by employees.	
<i>Customer Service - Basic Skills</i>	2 hours
Remember and use the four basic skills for customer service in any situation no matter how stressful. Learn how these skills can be applied in common customer service situations by viewing examples of employee responses to customer stress. Learn to draw the line between a stressed customer and your own stress.	
<i>Dealing with Difficult Situations with Special Resolution Tips</i>	2-3 hours
This class is the third in a series after Stress Management and Customer Service - Basic Skills. It is a very quick review of the four customer skills. The class discusses in depth some commonly occurring behaviors that are the most challenging and compares methods for handling them.	
<i>Diversity in the Workplace</i>	2-3 hours
Designed to increase understanding and tolerance among diverse populations within the county workforce. This session covers patterning, modeling and stereotypes that can lead to claims of discrimination. This presentation covers both concrete and theoretical aspects of diversity that influence our ability to perceive, work with and get along with others who are different on a variety of continuums. It includes discussion of theories of discrimination, organizational psychology, complexity of the work assigned and theories that explain how and why we work well or not so well with other persons and how we can use that information to improve our relationships in a diverse work setting.	
<i>Ethics for Personal Care Providers</i>	1 hour

HIPAA Privacy and Security	1 hour
This class covers the detailed regulatory purpose and design of the Act and highlights the primary functions of the counties to bring them into compliance with HIPAA regulations. Explains the health privacy duties of both HIPAA and state laws to the extent they are more protective of health information privacy.	
Job Interviewing and Selection	2 hours
This class covers the types of interviewing, rules on reference checks, exempt and non-exempt categories of employment and veteran re-employment rules.	
Job Interviewing and Selection for Supervisors	2-3 hours
This covers the law, theory and practice of effective interviewing and selection techniques. Of interest only to supervisors and managers who have assigned interviewing and selection duties. Can be presented with practice exercises.	
Leave Management for Supervisors	2 hours
A basic level briefing for elected officials, department heads and managers on the county duties to customers, employees and the public under the various leave laws. Current interpretations of cases and regulations will be analyzed and have an opportunity to ask for more detailed information during class discussions.	
Managing Supervisors Liability	2 hours
Basic discussion of a supervisor's responsibility for managing risks in the workplace. Covers employment claims and safety issues from a preventative perspective. Good for first time supervisors, supervisors coming from the private sector and newly elected officials. Includes film clips generating group discussion.	
Open Records and Open Meetings	1-2 hours
This class is designed to present the Colorado Open Records Act provisions and Open Meetings that are most frequently used in county government. This focuses on practical methods and does not cover case law on the various provisions which can be amended frequently.

1.5 hours

Supervisory Skills II

2 hours

Coordinating worker's compensation; Family Medical Leave and disability leave; preparing for performance counseling meetings; preparing for disciplinary action; taking action for absenteeism/leave abuse; review and preparation for a termination.

Wage and Hour Responsibilities for Supervisors

1-2 hours

A basic course covering what supervisors know to ensure accurate, legal time sheet reporting. Helpful information for understanding the how, what and why of recording time worked and time off and how to supervise use of leave.

Workers' Compensation Basics

1-2 hours

This discusses the best practices for managing your workers' compensation costs. By starting with the recommended written safety and leave policies and ending with proper record-keeping and supervision of absences, you can minimize county lost time due to injuries.

Workers' Compensation for Supervisors

2-3 hours

This class covers material and concepts related to the County Supervisor's role in managing Workers Compensation costs by understanding basics of the Colorado Statutes on Workers Compensation. Also covers the management related issues concerning the injury, treatment, absences, and the techniques of supervising a recovering employee when returning on modified duty assignments.

Anti-Bias Training for Law Enforcement

4 hours

Required by State Statutes (CRS 42-4-115 Profiling) and (CRS 24-31-309(2) Biased Policing) for all Certified Peace Officers.

Law Enforcement and Detention

- Bloodborne Pathogens for Emergency Responders** 2 hours
Universal precautions refers to practices for avoiding contact with other's bodily fluids. Under universal precautions all patients are considered to be possible carriers of blood-borne pathogens, including bloodborne and airborne. This class is recommended for emergency responders, nurses and health care support workers who are required to come into contact with patients or bodily fluids. This includes staff and others who may not come into direct contact with patients.
- Ergonomic Office vs Vehicle** 1 hour
This is a presentation on properly adjusting workstations to minimize ergonomic strains and injuries, emphasizing vehicle ergonomics.
- HazCom/GHS** 2 hours
Hazard Communication Standard Federal regulation on identifying chemical hazards in the workplace. Procedures for chemical inventory, reading a Safety Data Sheet (SDS) and safely working with chemicals on the job. Includes Global Harmonized System (GHS).
- Infection Control for Law Enforcement** 3 hours
Employee safety and risk of infection management class on required methods used to prevent, control and minimize risks from contamination by common bacteria and viruses with particular regard to LE activities. Does address PPE and how to handle common situations.
- Risk Management for Law Enforcement** 2 hours
Employee training on recognizing and addressing hazards in employee work tasks or work areas. Provides and trains on a process of identifying hazards and choosing personal protective equipment (PPE) for employees.
- Verbal Self Defense** 2-3 hours
Class designed to meet the needs of detention staff in understanding basic incident prevention factors and the basic elements of verbal communication under stress. Recognize the types of particular difficult behaviors and special responses and how this general knowledge is used when applied in LE situations, including verbal control of inmates.

Legal Issues

- Budget Seminar** 1 hour
This class is designed to give elected officials an understanding of how to create a county budget and the various statutes that relate to the county budget.
- Colorado Government Immunity Act** 1 hour
This class is designed to give elected officials and managers a basic understanding of how the CGIA addresses the potential for various liability lawsuits against local governments. Discusses the specific limits of statutory immunity and familiarizes the class with the types of acts, conduct and factors that influence the immunity of elected officials.
- Election Laws for County Employees-Briefing** 1 hour
A short class to cover the duties and responsibilities of county staff and officials under election law, conflict of interest law and rules against partisan politics in the public workplace.

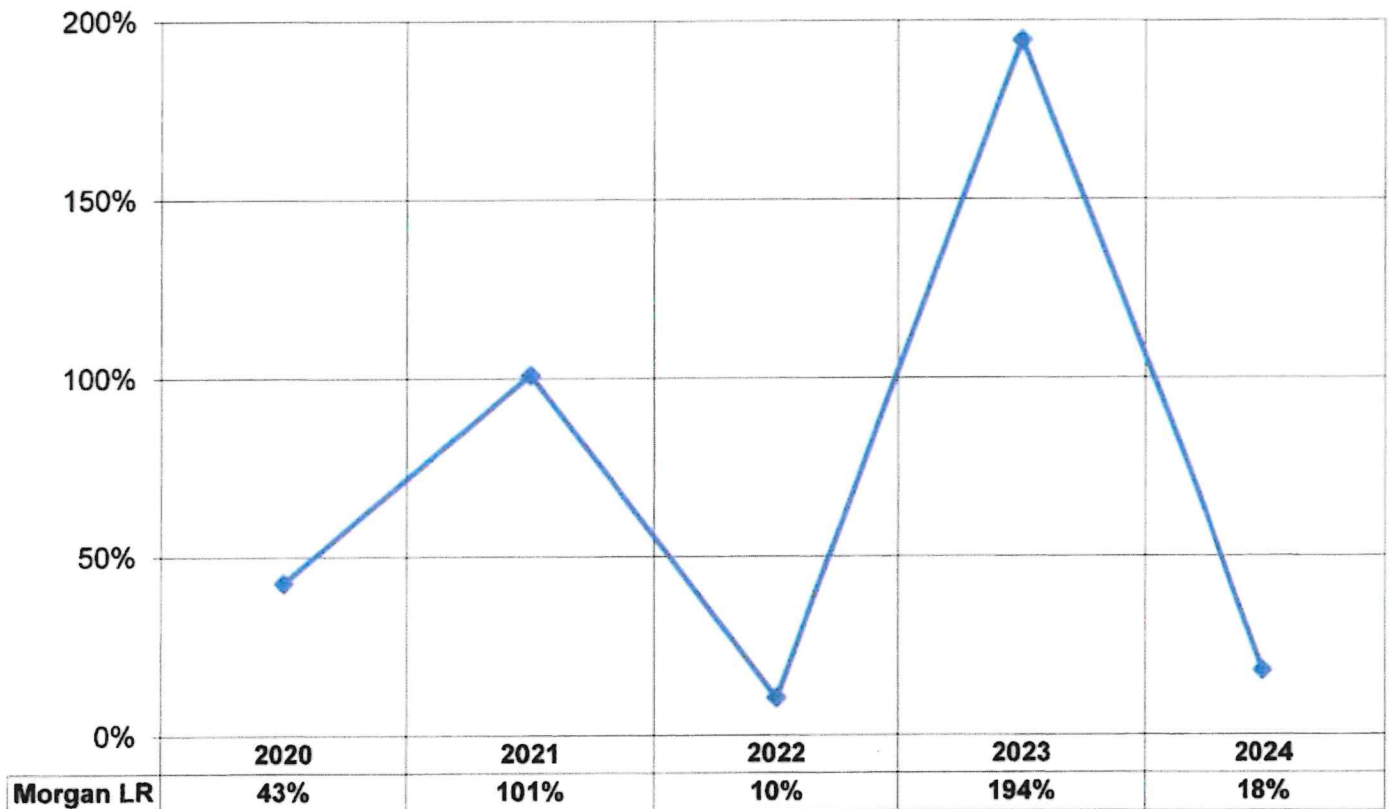

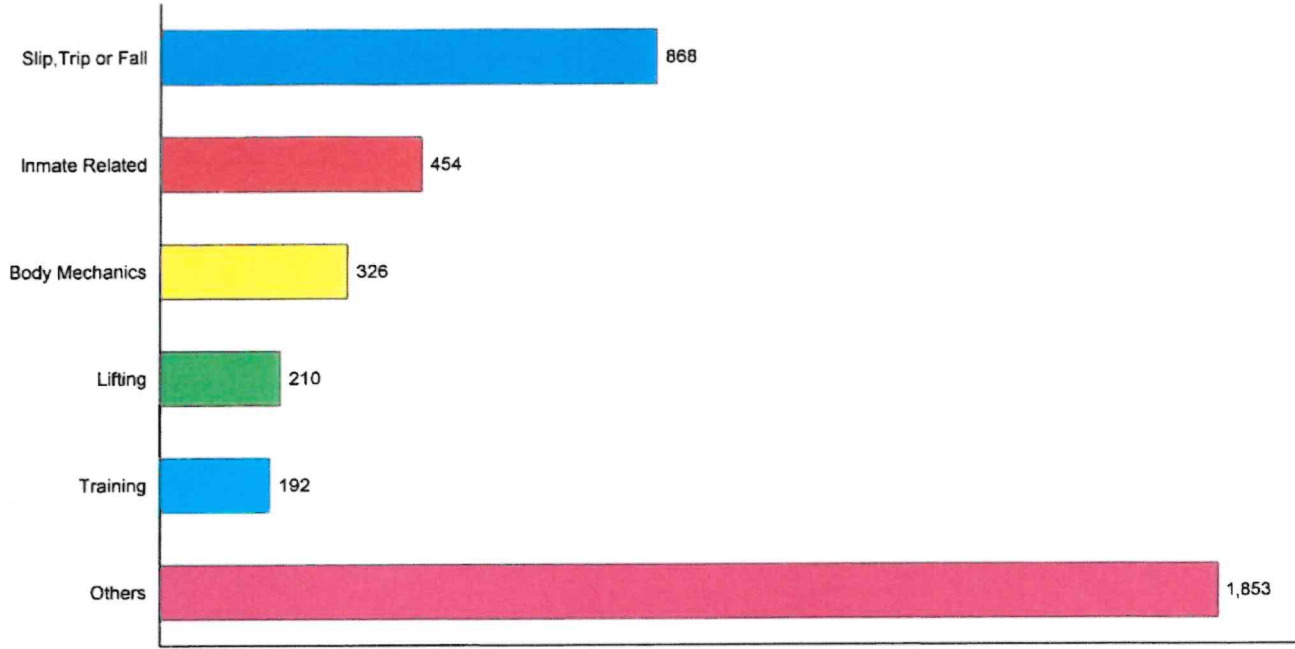

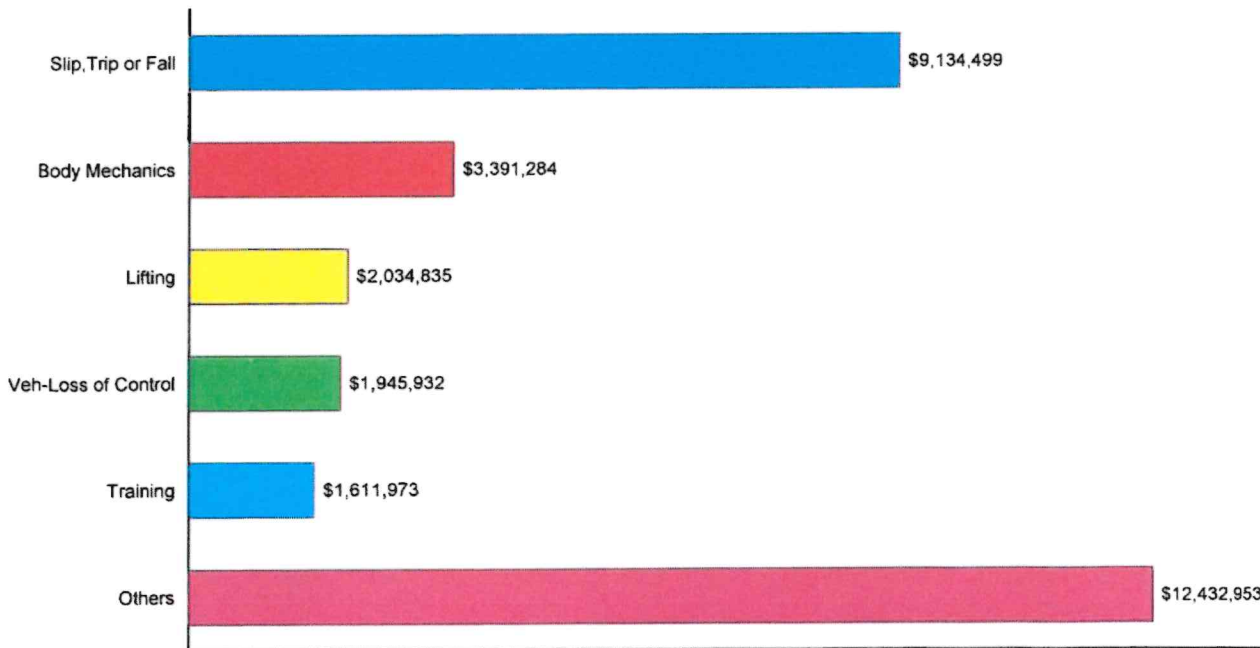

Dear Ms. McClain,

I am writing to express Morgan County's support of the Northeast Colorado Health Department's (NCHD) request for Congressionally Directed Spending to be used for building a new Public Health Facility in Fort Morgan, Colorado.

Morgan County is the most densely populated of the six counties served by NCHD. While Morgan County does have the highest median household income of Health Statistics Region 1 at \$62,914, it also has the highest percent of households with children that have received food stamps in the past year (39.9%) and the second highest percent of adults without health insurance coverage (17.3%), indicating a large income gap across the county. Fort Morgan is the largest city in Morgan County and is the third most diverse community in Colorado. NCHD serves as a safety net provider and endeavors to address the barriers that the underserved populations of Morgan County experience.

NCHD protects our communities from environmental hazards through focused efforts on food safety, water and air quality, and zoonotic disease. Clinical services offered include reproductive healthcare, immunizations, specialty clinics for children with special healthcare needs, and the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC).

Public health services provided to Morgan County residents is limited at NCHD's current 5,200 square foot facility. A new facility, with double the square footage, will significantly increase NCHD's capacity to serve the public. In 2023, NCHD purchased land from the City of Fort Morgan for a nominal fee and the new location will be co-located in a health and human services neighborhood which will further reduce many access barriers to healthcare and human services for those of low socioeconomic status. In 2024, NCHD completed pre-construction work and is shovel ready.

We support the use of these public funds to benefit the residents of Morgan County.

**A JOINT RESOLUTION OF THE MORGAN COUNTY BOARD OF COUNTY
COMMISSIONERS AND THE MORGAN COUNTY SHERIFF OPPOSING
SENATE BILL 25-003**

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 25-003, which, if passed, will regulate the manufacture, distribution, transfer, sale, and purchase of specified semi-automatic firearms and classify a rapid-fire device as a prohibited dangerous weapon;

WHEREAS, the Second Amendment to the United States Constitution, adopted in 1791 as part of the Bill of Rights, protects the inalienable and individual right of the people to keep and bear arms;

WHEREAS, the Supreme Court in the *District of Columbia v. Heller*, 554 U.S. 570 (2008), held that "[t]he Second Amendment...is the very product of an interest balancing by the people...(which) surely elevates above all other interests the rights of law-abiding, responsible citizens to use arms in defense of hearth and home...";

WHEREAS, the Supreme Court in *McDonald v. Chicago*, 561 U.S. 742 (2010), affirmed that the right of an individual to "keep and bear arms," as protected under the Second Amendment, is incorporated by the Due Process Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment against the "infringement by the States";

WHEREAS, the Supreme Court, in *United States v. Miller*, 307 U.S. 174 (1939), opined that firearms that could "contribute to the common defense" are protected by the Second Amendment;

WHEREAS, Article II, Section 3 of the Constitution of Colorado provides that all "persons have certain inalienable rights, among which may be reckoned the right of enjoying and defending their lives and liberties; of acquiring, possessing and protecting property; and of seeking and obtaining their safety and happiness...";

WHEREAS, Article II, Section 13 of the Constitution of Colorado provides that the "right of no person to keep and bear arms in defense of his home, person and property, or in aid of the civil power when thereto legally summoned, shall be called in question...";

WHEREAS, Article II, Section 11 of the Constitution of Colorado provides that no "ex post facto law, nor law impairing the obligation of contracts, or retrospective in its operation... shall be passed by the general assembly...";

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 25-003 will impose unconstitutional, harsher, unnecessary, and ineffective restrictions on law-abiding citizens and result in an unconstitutional overreach by the Colorado General Assembly;

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 25-003 imposes another unfunded mandate on Counties to manage the licensing process for semi-automatic firearms, resulting in increased costs for personnel, record-keeping, and regulatory oversight;

WHEREAS, many Counties are currently struggling to provide essential services and infrastructure to their citizens and Senate Bill 25-003 will divert even more funding away from these services;

WHEREAS, the County Sheriffs of Colorado have voiced their strong opposition to Senate Bill 25-003 and the burden it will place on the operations of their Offices;

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 25-003 will also have a detrimental impact on firearm-related businesses, including manufacturers, retailers, and sporting organizations that contribute to local economies and could result in job losses, decreased tax revenue, and harm to small businesses;

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners and the Morgan County Sheriff took an oath to support and defend the United States Constitution, the Constitution of the State of Colorado and the laws of the State of Colorado and by implication, question the constitutionality of legislation that infringes upon constitutional rights, while supporting practical and effective public safety measures;

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 25-003 does not represent practical and effective public safety measures and imposes excessive and unnecessary burdens on responsible and law-abiding gun owners, counties, and law enforcement agencies; and

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 25-003 disregards the values of the citizens of Morgan County, will negatively impact them financially, and will infringe upon and harm their quality of life.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF MORGAN COUNTY, COLORADO:

Dear Governor Polis, Senator Pelton, and Representative Johnson,

As the Morgan County Board of County Commissioners and the Morgan County Sheriff, we write to express our strong opposition to SB25-003.

As described in detail in the enclosed joint resolution, the proposed legislation is unconstitutional, as it seeks to limit access to semi-automatic firearms in the State of Colorado and expand the definition of what constitutes a prohibited dangerous weapon.

As you are aware, the Second Amendment of the United States Constitution and Article II, Section 13 of the Colorado Constitution explicitly protect the right of Coloradans to bear arms, to defend themselves, their families and their property. This bill will establish a troubling precedent for Colorado and runs contrary to the values held close by the citizens of Morgan County, who deserve to have their established rights protected.

The negative impact of the bill does not end with its unconstitutionality. The bill will be detrimental to local businesses and local economies and increase the financial burden on already strained County resources as yet another unfunded mandate.

We strongly urge you to vote against and veto this bill and consider alternative options that respect the constitutional rights of Colorado citizens. We welcome any opportunity to discuss this matter further and to work collaboratively on solutions.
